Pro bono representation comes in many forms: trial, settlement conferences, depositions and discovery, mediations. We recognize that many of the participants listed above took on more than one case last year, and also that other lawyers and firms provide substantial out-of-court advice and counsel behind the scenes on a pro bono basis; this too is essential work for which we extend our gratitude.

The legendary Judge Edward Weinfeld famously said, "Every case is different, and every case is important because it is important to the parties in that case." Many of the litigants who received pro bono representation last year handled cases implicating constitutional rights and important civil rights issues – from employment discrimination to conditions of confinement and use of force. Others represented clients in cases involving important commercial rights. Some of the plaintiffs who were represented by pro bono counsel would otherwise have had to litigate a case from a prison or jail. Whatever the subject or scope of the pro bono representation or the outcome, connecting indigent litigants with high quality representation has been a priority of the legal profession since its inception. Even where litigants do not prevail, pro bono representation ensures that their inability to hire an attorney did not limit their opportunity to be heard. And the Court benefits from the cumulative effect of pro bono service too: with timely appearances by responsible pro bono counsel, cases move along more swiftly and judges are able to address more cases more thoroughly and more efficiently.
